Keynote Speakers



Bruce Adamson, Children and Young People's Commissioner: Bruce is a lawyer with over 20 years of experience in human rights. As Commissioner since 2017 he has been responsible for promoting and safeguarding the rights of children and young people across Scotland. His office, working with their young advisers, have helped secure legislative change in relation to the age of criminal responsibility, the physical punishment of children, and hopefully within the next few months the incorporation of the UNCRC into Scots law.

Bruce has acted as an international expert for the United Nations, Council of Europe, European Union, OSCE, and during the covid pandemic advised the WHO on children's rights. He has worked in over 20 countries and has been a member of international advisory groups on issues such as child human rights defenders, strategic litigation, strengthening children's rights institutions, and reform of the European Court of Human Rights.

He is a former Chair of the European Network of Ombuds for Children representing 44 Independent Children's Rights Institutions from across the Council of Europe. He was a member of the Children's Panel for 13 years and is a former Chair of the Scottish Child Law Centre.

Andrew Kean, CEO and Founder Firstpoint USA: After spells with Hearts and Motherwell, Andrew earned a soccer scholarship to the University of Cincinnati and became the program's first All-American award winner in their history.

In 2001, Andrew founded FirstPoint USA with the assistance of a £1,000 loan from the Prince's Scottish Youth Business Trust, and 20 years later the company has gone on to support over 20,000 young sportsmen and women to pursue a similar life-changing experience. A highly respected business



leader, he has been a finalist in the Shell LIVEwire Entrepreneur of the Year and Royal Bank of Scotland Young Entrepreneur of the Year awards, respectively. In 2002, he was named as a finalist for the 'Scotsman of the Year' award, while he has also served on the Board of the England Women's Golf Association (now England Golf) and as an Aftercare Advisor for the Prince's Trust.

lain Corbett: Iain is a youth worker and community development practitioner with a wealth of experience supporting young people in Glasgow and the west. Currently he is involved in a number of projects. He is a youth mentor at G20 works – a CiC looking to reduce violence and offending by providing jobs and personal development. He is a Research Associate at the University of Glasgow exploring Public Health, Youth and Violence Reduction and is a Project Development Lead at NeighbourlyLab, a UK wide non-profit organisation using innovative ways of bringing people



together. His own lived experience of violence, antisocial behaviour and navigating the justice system also led lain to joining the Executive Governance Group at the Children and Young Peoples Centre for Justice (CYCJ)

Tim Frew, CEO Youthlink: Tim Frew is Chief Executive of YouthLink Scotland. He graduated with MA (Hons) in History & Classics at the University of Glasgow, in 1996, completed a PGCCE to qualify as a Community Education practitioner from the University of Edinburgh in 2000 and achieved an MBA from University of Strathclyde Business School in 2011. Tim has been working in the youth work sector for over 20 years, in England and Scotland for the public and voluntary sectors. Tim has had a range of roles at YouthLink Scotland and led on a number of key sector initiatives and national



programmes. He is a proud member of the Standards Council for CLD, and was one of the first committee members as a member of CeVe and served on the Approvals Committee of the Council from 2008 until recently. Tim is an Associate Assessor for Education Scotland and Co-Chairs the #IWill Advisory Group for Scotland and the NYWS Stakeholder Reference Group.
