Orkney and Shetland Valuation Joint Board: 3 March 2022.

Live Streaming of Meetings.

Report by Clerk to the Board.

# 1. Purpose of Report

To consider arrangements for live-streaming meetings of the Orkney and Shetland Valuation Joint Board.

### 2. Recommendations

The Board is invited to note:

#### 2.1.

That the 2020/21 Annual Audit Report includes a recommendation that the Board should consider how technology can be utilised to further encourage stakeholders and demonstrate continuous improvement in its journey of increasing openness and transparency, including live streaming meetings or permitting remote live access to meetings.

#### 2.2.

That, during the pandemic, in-person meetings ceased, and recordings of meetings were placed on the webpages of the constituent Council.

### 2.3.

That, from 1 October 2021, live broadcasting of Board meetings took place.

### 2.4.

That Orkney Islands Council currently provides live audio-casting of Board meetings.

### 2.5.

That facilities for live streaming meetings are in the early stages of implementation in Shetland Island Council and therefore not currently available for meetings of the Board.

#### It is recommended:

### 2.6.

That the Board adopts a policy of live streaming all meetings of the Board, subject to the availably of live streaming facilities and for those items of business which do not contain exempt or confidential information.

# 3. Background

### 3.1.

In the 2020/21 Annual Audit Report, a recommendation was made that the Board should consider how technology can be utilised to further encourage stakeholders and demonstrate continuous improvement in its journey of increasing openness and transparency, including live streaming meetings or permitting remote live access to meetings.

#### 3.2.

In general, live streaming of video or audio makes Board business more open and accessible for interested parties, particularly for those who are unable to travel to attend a Board meeting in person. As well as live broadcasts, a listen-again service can be provided via the relevant Board webpages on the constituent Councils' websites.

### 3.3.

During the pandemic, in-person meetings ceased, and recordings of meetings were placed on the webpages of the constituent Councils. However, from 1 October 2021, the Board was no longer able to exclude the public from meetings of the Board for Coronavirus-related reasons. Accordingly, live broadcasting of Board meetings took place.

### 3.4.

Since audio casting was first introduced for public meetings of the constituent Councils, the media has regularly made use of the facility to broadcast 'clips' of meetings as part of their news coverage, giving their audience a clearer insight of the decision-making process.

# 4. Audiocasting of Board Meetings

### 4.1.

The current technology available to the Board is reliant on that provided by the constituent Council facilities in which meetings of the Board are held. This may be video or audio casting.

### 4.2.

Orkney Islands Council (OIC) currently provides live audio-casting of Board meetings, and it is proposed that, for future meetings of the Board which are held inperson, these are continued to be audio-cast using OIC facilities.

### 4.3.

Shetland Islands Council (SIC) are currently at the early stages of implementation of live streaming and therefore until this facility is available, it may not be possible to live stream in-person meetings of the Board which are held in Shetland.

### 4.4.

As facilities for live streaming meetings exist in both constituent Councils, it is proposed that the Board adopt a policy of live streaming all meetings of the Board for those items of business which do not contain exempt or confidential information.

# 5. Equalities Impact

An Equality Impact Assessment has been undertaken and is attached as Appendix 1 to this report.

# 6. Financial Implications

There are no financial implications arising from this report as the current provision of audio casting is contained within the support services provided to the Board from the constituent Councils.

# 7. Governance Aspects

### 7.2.

The Standing Orders of the Board will require to be updated to include reference to live streaming of the business of the Board.
