On a small number of occasions, Police Scotland were required to Enforce and issue fixed penalty notices. This was done only to recidivist offenders where continued non-compliance of the Engage, Explain and Encourage guidelines were not adhered to.

Of this number, 5 relate to reports of 'Looked after Children'.</p> <p>Orkney Area Command has a Police Liaison Officer who maintains contact and liaison with the residential units in the area. This role has resulted in positive working relations between Police and residential unit staff. When required, the Police Liaison Officer works in conjunction with the Missing Person Co-ordinator who similarly enjoys a positive working relationship with residential units.</p>
