- Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Working in Conjunction with FASD Hub Scotland, Orkney ADP delivered a campaign of awareness raising relating to FASD. This included communications on social media, ADP website, development of FASD training embedded into established ABI training modules, promotion of FASD Hub Scotland resources and information sessions, etc. The FASD agenda in Orkney has been tied into the ongoing work to produce a Neurodevelopmental Pathway within NHS Orkney.
- SHAAP Rural Alcohol study ADP worked in partnership with SHAAP to provide a details
  relating to alcohol use and culture within a rural, island context. ADP co-ordinator Katie
  Spence subsequently participated in the official launch of the SHAAP report, speaking to
  hundreds of participants regarding to the particular challenges faced by island ADP's in
  addressing alcohol related harms.
- White Ribbon Campaign As an offshoot of Orkney ADP's participation in the local Domestic Abuse Forum the ADP has supported the development of 'White Ribbon Orkney' the local White Ribbon Group, campaigning to raise awareness of violence against women and girls. This has included promoting the campaign via ADP website and social media, the ADP Development Officer receiving White Ribbon Speaker training and participating in the 'Costa Del Kirkwall' local BID promotional event with an information stall & resources.
- International Recovery Day Promotion including social media and ADP website promoting Recovery awareness.
- International Overdose Awareness Day raising awareness of issues pertaining to Overdose via local media, ADP website, NHS Orkney & Orkney Islands Council media channels.
- Count14 Campaign Awareness raising around Count14, promotion via ADP website, social media, and ABI training. Deployment of resources provided by Scottish Government around GP practices and third Sector organisations throughout Orkney.
- Alcohol Awareness Week Promotion of AAW via local media, NHS Orkney and Orkney Islands Council, ADP social media and website, partnership work with Tesco's Kirkwall branch to have AAW information on view to customers throughout the week.

The first half of the year's training delivery was greatly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. Promotion of national online training was initially utilised including:

-Re-solv (Volatile Substance Abuse) Online Training

-Scottish Drugs Forum (online training and Covid-19 webinars series)

-Scottish Drugs Forum – Naloxone Training for Trainers

-Scottish Drugs Forum - Sex, Drugs & Vulnerable Young People, Stigma, Basic Drug Awareness, Cannabis Awareness.

-CREW – Drugs Awareness



In addition, the ADP Support Team provided locally delivered training online such as the adapted Alcohol Brief Interventions, Basic Drugs Awareness and Benzodiazepines Awareness via MS Teams. This included providing support to Guidance Staff at both secondary schools and directly to senior pupils.

At the beginning of the year, the ADP Development Officer co-delivered training as part of the 'Stepping Stones' project at Orkney College for young adults with additional support needs.

Digital resources were provided to organisations throughout Orkney, including the new CREW drug resource booklets, Rethink Your Drink Cards, Drink Diaries, etc. The ADP website is regularly updated with digital versions of drug & alcohol resources. Physical resources such as Alcohol Unit measuring cups, Naloxone promotional items, and hard copies of resources are available upon request.

ABI Training remains a priority in addressing alcohol related harms in Orkney. Staff from the following organisations received ABI training; Police Scotland, Orkney Women's Aid, Orkney Youth Café, Orkney YPeople, Orkney Islands Council SEAL Team, Orkney Islands Council Community Learning & Development.

Support was provided to both of the Orkney secondary schools, Orkney College & Third Sector charities working with children & young people, including: 'Healthy Me' sessions at Stromness Academy. Partnership working with Orkney Drugs Dog, an ADP commissioned service, to deliver drug awareness sessions at Kirkwall Grammar School & Stromness Academy with a focus on harm reduction messaging. Basic Drug Awareness information sessions as part of the 'Stepping Stones' & 'Future Track' project at Orkney College for young adults with additional support needs. Basic Drug Awareness information sessions for VAO Connect Project with young adults who are disengaged from formal education.

Please give details of developments (max 300 words) The pre-existing Drug Related Death Sub Group have already embedded a referral process following a non-fatal overdose presenting to A&E which triggers the opportunity of referral into treatment and / or provision of Take Home Naloxone if appropriate. Furthermore, the ADP Co- ordinator met with Scottish Ambulance Service's Clinical Effectiveness Lead for Drug Harm Reduction to increase the coverage of Take Home Naloxone and have a Non-Fatal Overdose Pathway in place with SAS. The Non-Fatal Overdose Pathway between NHS Orkney and SAS was confirmed in July 2021 with daily non-fatal overdose data sent to a generic email picked up via the Drug and Alcohol Team. To date there have been no incidents since the pathway was set up.		
3.2 Please provide details on the process for rapid re-engagement in alcohol and/or drug services following a period of absence, particularly for those at risk and during COVID-19. Are services fully open at normal levels / blended services on offer? (max 300 words). There is a duty system at the Community Mental Health Team (Tier 3 service) which is open 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday, where advice is given and cases can be picked up directly. This has not changed during COVID-19. The service also accepts direct referral from the Balfour Hospital for follow up. Telephone and Near Me digital appointments can be offered where appropriate and in some cases this has remained the preferred method of communication however for those who have not been seen in person for 12 months, an in person appointment has been arranged to check in. Face to face appointments for those 'high risk' individuals have remained throughout the pandemic and beyond both in the community and within clinical settings. It is expected that the continuation of services will remain as a blended model of both face-to-face and digital appointments.

3.4 What measures were introduced to improve access to alcohol and/or drug treatment and support services during the year, particularly for those at risk 20/21 (max 300 words).

NHS Orkney Drug and Alcohol Team are able to offer access to treatment via alternative options such as 'Near Me' Platform and tele-health options. The service introduced a home delivery service for Opioid Replacement Therapies (ORT) during the COVID-19 outbreak. Also reduced supervised dispensing and increased prescription lengths. In addition a pilot project via the Third Sector was commissioned to deliver assertive outreach for those individual who require additional support to get into and stay in treatment. The service was successful in gaining further funding via CORRA to continue the pilot. Orkney ADP will use the findings from this and utilise the Outreach Funding from the Scottish Government to explore further work in this area to increase capacity.

A local working group has been identified in preparation to undertake reviews of alcohol deaths in line with the guidance published by Alcohol Focus Scotland (AFS). As an interim support measure, island ADP Co-ordinators had been meeting with the Policy & Development Co-ordinator from AFS to support local roll out however the individual occupying that post has now left AFS and there has been no further work progressed.

3.22 Please provide a summary of arrangements which were in place to carry out <u>reviews on drug related</u> <u>deaths</u> and how lessons learned are built into practice (max 300 words)

There is a dedicated local Drug Related Death Group (multiagency) who meet at minimum twice per year if there are no deaths and as required following local deaths within the community. There are very low numbers of drug related deaths in Orkney, and the number can vary from year upon year so no distinct trend. There is a protocol in place for the group to review deaths with relevant recommendations and learning points to be shared with the appropriately identified committees.

range of therapeutic treatments including: play therapy, sand therapy, psychodynamic and therapeutic support for young people up to the age of 25. Sessions can be delivered face-to-face or virtually depending on the preference of the young person, there is an option for parents/carers			

or virtually depending on the preference of the young person, there is an option for parents/carers and / or family members to be involved if desired by the young person. All young people who engage with the service have a risk assessment undertaken and an agreed recovery plan in place which they are active in setting goals. During the 2020/21 period a total of 39 new referrals (19 carried over from the previous year) were made to the service with 422 counselling sessions arranged and 344 delivered. The numbers show a small decrease from the previous year (4 less referrals). Progress is monitored through YP Core and Core 10 to monitor individual outcomes. Whilst not commissioned by the ADP, Y People Orkney also delivers the supported accommodation facility for young people so there is a positive access route for supporting our most vulnerable young people in the community.

Orkney ADP commission Relationships Scotland Orkney to deliver CRAFT and adult and family counselling. In addition to specialist work, Family Support Workers continue to provide a range of support to individuals and families including mentoring and personal development, practical tools and coping strategies. A total of 14 alcohol and drug cases were opened during this reporting period, resulting in 111 sessions being offered and 83 attended. At intake, 76% of clients presented with at least one risk factor (63% mental health concerns, 17% domestic abuse, 23% risk of suicide), 7% alcohol and 2% drugs, 1.5% with other addictions. We involve clients, and their loved ones where appropriate, in working out what is appropriate for them at any given time, and supporting them to make positive choices. We have CRAFT practitioners specifically trained to work with and involve family members in supporting recovery, where appropriate.

### a) Upon arrest

All individuals who enter local custody settings are offered an Alcohol Brief Intervention to assess their drinking levels. A handout of local and national support services and helplines is also given in a paper format for people to take away with them if desired. In some occasions where there is concern for the individual's wellbeing an entry would be made on the Vulnerable Person's Database for consideration by the concern hub and appropriate sharing thereafter. Please provide details on what was in place and how well this was executed......

#### b) Upon release from prison

The Criminal Justice Service in Orkney would only have contact with those subject to statutory licence and referral would be made by the allocated supervising officer to alcohol/ drug service if required. Again if the individual is known to criminal justice a pre-release Integrated Case Management conference is held 4 months prior to release for the purpose of identifying outstanding needs such as substance use and referrals are placed accordingly to maintain continuity of treatment/support. However, the team are not involved in cases where a short-term sentence has been served and the individual is not known to justice services. For those without statutory licence, it is relied upon Scottish Prison Service to contact our local alcohol and drug treatment service prior to release to provide referral into local services. Due to the small numbers and the nature of the community this usually is managed well however there can be difficulties with prisoners being placed at a range of prisons across Scotland and each prison operating slightly differently.

Whilst delivering interventions and promotional campaigns such as the Scottish Government's Count 14 Campaign, targeted audience's of older males through initiatives such as 'The Men's Shed'.

Whilst not directly commissioned by the Orkney ADP, the Orkney Youth Cafe has been pivotal in providing a venue and supporting the set up of a young person's LGBTQ+ group in Orkney which has been very successful in engaging with young people who can often feel marginalised and vulnerable in a small close-knit community. OADP frequently visit the cafe to deliver bespoke training and information sessions. ADP Support staff have signed up to the NHS Pride Badge Pledge to demonstrate support for the LGBT+ and minority ethnic communities. Education and information is regularly shared but particularly marked around National Pride Month.

6.6 Minority ethnic communities

A number of our services now offer information in translated formats or can provide a translator to encourage access and quality of service provision.

6.7 Religious communities

Orkney ADP Support Team continues to deliver annual drug and alcohol training to the Orkney Street Pastors Group who provides support on the streets at the weekends. Whilst the initiative is not religious based the volunteer pastors are made up from across the religious denominations in Orkney.



6.8 Women and girls (including pregnancy and maternity)

The OADP is a member of the Domestic Abuse Forum and contributes to the quarterly meetings as well as the Domestic Abuse (incorporating violence against women) action plan. The ADP have supported the co-ordination and set up of a Women's only mutual aid peer group (SMART Recovery) facilitated by Women's Aid Orkney. Following a successful application to the programme for funding, a Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Group has been formed, overseen by the ADP. The group is focusing on developing a pathway for neurodevelopmental screening, support for families and professionals as well as training and preventative work, this includes support and delivery within maternity and health visiting services.
