Public Bus Services – Contract Monitoring.

Report by Corporate Director for Enterprise and Sustainable Regeneration.

1. Purpose of Report

To present monitoring information in respect of public bus services for 2022/23.

2. Recommendations

The Committee is invited to note:

2.1.

Passenger carryings for the period January to July 2023, together with fare income for subsidised public bus services, excluding the X1 service which is commercial, for financial year 2022/23, as outlined in Appendix 1 to this report.

2.2.

That no formal complaints were received during 2022/23 in respect of public bus services in operation across Orkney.

3. Background

3.1.

In 2019, the School and Public Bus Contract was tendered with a focus on quality with the view to improving the service provided from the main contractor in previous years, with ageing fleet. The Contract was therefore a significant investment by the Council, resulting in a fleet of new low floored, accessible, Euro 6 low emission vehicles from the main contractor and growth in passenger carryings following the pandemic.

3.2.

Bids were invited on the basis that the Council provide a small fleet of diesel buses or electric buses to operate public bus services across the mainland of Orkney. At the time of tender, no bids were received to operate services using electric buses, noting that a spare fleet would be required for range and reliability reasons. The winning bid from Stagecoach to operate all mainland based public bus routes and the majority of school services, was on the basis of the operator purchasing the fleet. As the Contract was tendered during the pandemic, the tender bid received was based on the cost to operate the service, with any bus passenger fare income,

including concessionary fares claimed back by Scottish Government, to be retained by the Council.

3.3.

In February 2022, the Development and Infrastructure Committee recommended establishment of a Sustainable and Green Transport Fund from the bus passenger fare income received. This income has been used to match fund external funding from the Scottish Government Smarter Choices, Smarter Places initiative which has seen the introduction of evening bus services across the county and has also been used to enhance the existing community transport budget, seeing the roll out of community transport projects in Sanday, Stronsay, North Ronaldsay, Papa Westray, Shapinsay, Rousay and Hoy as well as the continuation and expansion of the Dial a Bus Service.

3.4.

Public bus services across Orkney have therefore significantly improved since the start of the new bus contract and due to income received through bus passenger fares, improvements have also been made to community transport services across the county.

3.5.

It was agreed that a report would be submitted to the Development and Infrastructure Committee annually for contract monitoring purposes.

4. Passenger Figures and Fare Income

4.1.

The passenger carryings for the period January to July 2023, together with fare income for subsidised public bus services (excluding X1 service which is commercial) for financial year 2022/23, are outlined in Appendix 1 to this report.

4.2.

Unlike the rest of Scotland and the wider UK, Orkney has seen steady passenger growth across its public bus services year on year. Passenger carryings decreased during the pandemic as the use of public transport was discouraged. However, figures have picked up significantly during 2023, with carryings exceeding prepandemic levels.

4.3.

In order to encourage further uptake of public bus services, investment has been made in the service by creating evening bus links and enhancements where possible such as the refurbishment of existing bus shelters and timetable displays. The bus enhancements will be subject to continuation of the Sustainable and Green Transport Fund, established through bus passenger fare income.

4.4.

There have been no formal complaints received in respect of public bus services in operation across Orkney. The quality and reliability of service carried out since the start of the existing Contract has been to a very high standard. Officers meet regularly with operators to ensure services are operated in accordance with the Contract and to discuss possible improvements to services where possible.

5. Corporate Governance

This report relates to the Council complying with governance and procedural issues and therefore does not directly support and contribute to improved outcomes for communities as outlined in the Council Plan and the Local Outcomes Improvement Plan.

6. Financial Implications

6.1.

The annual public bus budget for 2023/24 towards subsidised services is £1,247,300.

6.2.

The public bus contract awarded in August 2021 was on a zero fares basis meaning that bus fare income, including concessionary fares is now retained by the Council.

6.3.

On 1 March 2022, the Policy and Resources Committee recommended that fare income be utilised to establish a Sustainable and Green Transport Fund. A decision was made during the budget setting process for financial year 2023/24 to disestablish this fund, and for any fare income generated to be used as saving on the public bus contract costs.

6.4.

On 28 March 2023, the Development and Infrastructure Committee recommended continuation of the Sustainable and Green Transport Fund, established from bus passenger fare income now retained by the Council, in accordance with the terms of the new public bus contract.

6.5.

At the end of financial year 2022/23 the Sustainable and Green Transport Fund balance was £55,852 and it is anticipated that fare income in the region of £150,000 per annum going forward will be transferred into the Sustainable and Green Transport Fund. This fund will be used specifically for sustainable transport initiatives, including active travel, as a means to off-set existing transport CO2 emissions and to invest in sustainable and green transport solutions for the future.

6.6.

The School and Public Bus Contract is subject to an amendment to contract rate which is applied in August each year. The Contract applied a maximum uplift of 3% to be applied per annum which was applied during 2022/23 and 2023/24.

7. Legal Aspects

7.1.

Financial monitoring and reporting help the Council meet its statutory obligation to secure best value.

7.2.

The School and Public Bus Contract states that the operator shall provide the Council with the number of passengers carried on each Local Bus Service, a breakdown of the number of tickets sold in terms of adults, children and concessionaries and total fare income.

7.3.

The School and Public Bus Contract sets out that the Contractor shall set up a customer complaints procedure. Written records of all complaints received, and actions taken are to be retained and a copy of such information is to be provided to the Council on a monthly basis in arrears. Receipt of such information helps the Council to monitor the performance of the contract and thereby meet its statutory obligation to ensure best value.

Public Bus Passenger Carryings and Fare Income

The bus passenger figures for the period January to July 2023 are outlined below by route and by month. The passenger carryings by month are up significantly from the previous year, with January reaching 7,475 compared with 4,682 from the previous year on all subsidised services (excludes X1 commercial bus service). In June, passenger figures reached 13,798 on subsidised services, compared with 10,252 the previous year.
